




















This year we had a split session which was new to all the students. School began at 7:25 for half of the students and at 12:45 for the others. This schedule made it difficult for student





Spirit Week burst into action with new themes speeding up the pace and adding to the

excitement











This year the Cougars carried on the tradition of excellence in their athletic abilities. Proving their




The Frosh football team









I Revitalization I

Project. The scheme would transform Reservior Street, now a run down back alley, into a second artery for traffic as well as a 300 slot parking lot. In addition the project would open up 1500 lineal feet of business frontage. Merchants held their breaths as the city drew up plans, made models, applied for a construction grant from the Economic Development Agency, and finally sent four city council members to Washington D.C. to lobby for the project after E.D.A. offered to fund only half the project.
